AAADD offers adults with developmental disabilities the opportunity to further develop their academic skills as well as build social skills within a college environment.

Students work on individualized materials, at their own pace with the assistance of the class counsellor in both literacy and numeracy. The current events, computers, job search and life skills subjects involve group work. AAADD runs 40 weeks per year, beginning at the end of August and running through to the end of June. Students can attend AAADD day courses for a maximum of four years. Depending upon availability, applicants may be offered the option to attend evening courses prior to moving into the day. Online components are also available.

AAADD will be running recreational therapy summer camps for 6 weeks, starting in July until the end of August, for people with Developmental Disabilities aged 16 and older. If you are interested, you can sign up for as many weeks as you would like, up to a maximum of 6 weeks. Passport funding can be used for reimbursement. English Language Tutoring for the Ottawa Community (ELTOC) makes a significant difference in the lives of more than 200 newcomers each year by offering Language Instruction for Newcomers to Canada (LINC), an English language training program funded by Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC) that facilitates the integration of newcomers to Canada. Since 1992, ELTOC has been providing individualized and accessible home-based LINC tutoring to eligible newcomers who cannot attend regular ESL classes, thereby helping them gain the confidence and community ties that will help them integrate into Canadian society.

Newcomers are matched to volunteers in the community who are trained, mentored and supported by ELTOC ESL Education Counsellors that are TESL/OCELT certified. Our program is offered in the learners' homes based on a mutually convenient schedule, i.e. day, evening or on weekends. Learners are taught practical topics such as housing, banking, citizenship, how to get a job, etc. The program is offered to permanent residents and protected persons ages 18 and older.
